News Online - RSS Feeds

What's it all about?

News feeds allow you to see when websites have added new content.

You can get the latest headlines and video in one place, as soon as it is published, without having to check the websites that you have a feed for.

Feeds are also known as RSS (don't worry what this stands for). The feeds themselves are just web pages, designed to be read by computers rather than people

Feeds are usually used for news and blog websites, but are also used for distributing other types of digital content, including pictures, audio files, or video. Web Browsers such as Internet Explorer 7 and Firefox can discover and display feeds as you visit websites. You can also subscribe to feeds to automatically check for and download updates that you can view later.

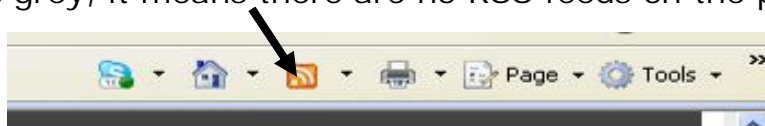
Try this

NB You'll need to have either Internet Explorer 7 or Firefox as your browser. You can have RSS feeds in Internet Explorer 6 but it's more complicated.

Go to www.bbc.co.uk and click News.

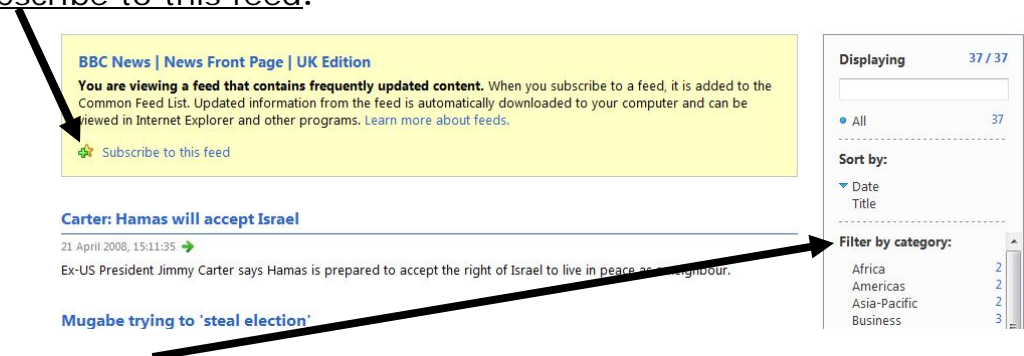
In the **Toolbar** there is an orange RSS icon.

(If the icon is grey, it means there are no RSS feeds on the page)



Click the icon to go to the BBC News feed.

To subscribe to feeds on the BBC News website, click the RSS icon and then click Subscribe to this feed.



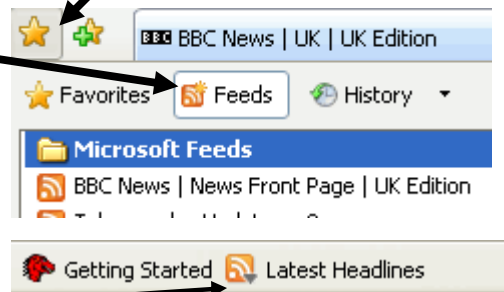
You can choose to **filter** the feeds so that you only see those on particular topics.

Your web browser will now download the feeds automatically for you. To view them in Internet Explorer 7, click the Favourites Centre.

Then click the Feeds button.

A list of the feeds you have subscribed to will now be displayed.

Click on them to read.



If you use Firefox as your web browser, click the Latest Headlines button.
